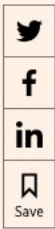

# President Biden is assembling a \$3 trillion package of investments on infrastructure and domestic needs

WASHINGTON — Fresh off passage of the COVID-19 relief bill, President Joe Biden is assembling the next big White House priority, a sweeping \$3 trillion package of investments on infrastructure and domestic needs.

Biden huddled privately late Monday with Senate Democrats as Congress has already begun laying the groundwork with legislation for developing roads, hospitals and green energy systems as part of Biden's "Build Back Better" campaign promise. Much like the \$1.9 trillion virus rescue plan signed into law earlier this month, the new package would also include family-friendly policies, this time focusing on education and paid family leave.

The White House plans are still preliminary, with a combined \$3 trillion in spending proposed to boost the economy and improve quality of life, according to a person familiar with the options who insisted on anonymity to discuss private conversations.

While the goal is a bipartisan package, Democrats in Congress have signaled a willingness to go it alone if they are blocked by Republicans.

"We need to get it done," said Sen. Richard Blumenthal, D-Conn., ahead of the virtual meeting with Biden at the senators' annual retreat Monday evening.

Biden's outreach to Senate Democrats comes as the White House is under fire for its handling of the U.S.-Mexico border. Migrant crossings are skyrocketing, with images of cramped holding facilities posing a humanitarian and political dilemma for the administration and its allies in Congress. The focus on infrastructure shifts attention back toward priorities that are potentially more popular with Americans and potentially bipartisan.

COVID-19 lockdowns may be gradually easing, but anxiety about the world's social and economic prospects is only intensifying. There is good reason to worry: a sharp economic downturn has already begun, and we could be facing the worst depression since the 1930s. But, while this outcome is likely, it is not unavoidable.

To achieve a better outcome, the world must act jointly and swiftly to revamp all aspects of our societies and economies, from education to social contracts and working conditions. Every country, from the United States to China, must participate, and every industry, from oil and gas to tech, must be transformed. In short, we need a "Great Reset" of capitalism.

There are many reasons to pursue a Great Reset, but the most urgent is COVID-19. Having already led to hundreds of thousands of deaths, the pandemic represents one of the worst public-health crises in recent history. And with casualties still mounting in many parts of the world, it is far from over.

A pandemia de covid-19 expôs e exacerbou um vasto leque de desigualdades. Se os líderes levarem a sério a medida "reconstruir melhor" as políticas para superar as forças sistémicas que as sustentam têm de constituir o cerne das suas agendas.

Uma dessas divisões é a diferença de género. Desde que a pandemia começou, as mulheres têm perdido os empregos a um ritmo superior ao dos homens - até porque estão sobrerrepresentadas em muitos dos setores mais afetados, como serviços de alimentação e retalho - e enfrentaram níveis mais elevados de precariedade social e insegurança alimentar. A pandemia está a aumentar também a diferença de género na pobreza extrema.

Além disso, tal como pensadoras feministas, por exemplo Silvia Federici, destacaram, a carga do trabalho doméstico, que já era desproporcionalmente suportada pelas mulheres, tornou-se muito mais pesada durante os confinamentos na pandemia. Ao mesmo tempo, as mulheres são geralmente as vítimas de violência doméstica, que se tornou mais frequente e grave desde o início da pandemia.

Não é surpreendente que a saúde mental das mulheres tenha sofrido desproporcionalmente no último ano. O fardo da pandemia tem sido particularmente pesado para as mulheres que também estão sujeitas a outras formas de

## O que nos propõe o Fórum Económico Mundial com o Grande Reset?

Segundo **Klaus Schwab** - “Uma coisa ficou clara! Não podemos voltar ao velho normal! Temos de aproveitar esta oportunidade como os nossos Pais e Avós fizeram depois da II Guerra Mundial para reflectir o que correu mal e o que poderemos fazer melhor.”

A juntar a estes três eixos fundamentais temos a **4ª Revolução Industrial (Indústria 4.0 / Digital)**, como motor de um conjunto de transformações tecnológicas como a Inteligência Artificial (IA) a Biotecnologia, a Robótica, a Engenharia Genética, a Neurotecnologia, a Nanotecnologia, a Realidade Virtual, a Realidade Virtual Aumentada, que vão trazer as alterações necessárias para esta verdadeira mudança de Paradigma a nível dos mais variados conceitos dados como adquiridos até agora e, da própria percepção da “realidade” que vão ser totalmente alterados.

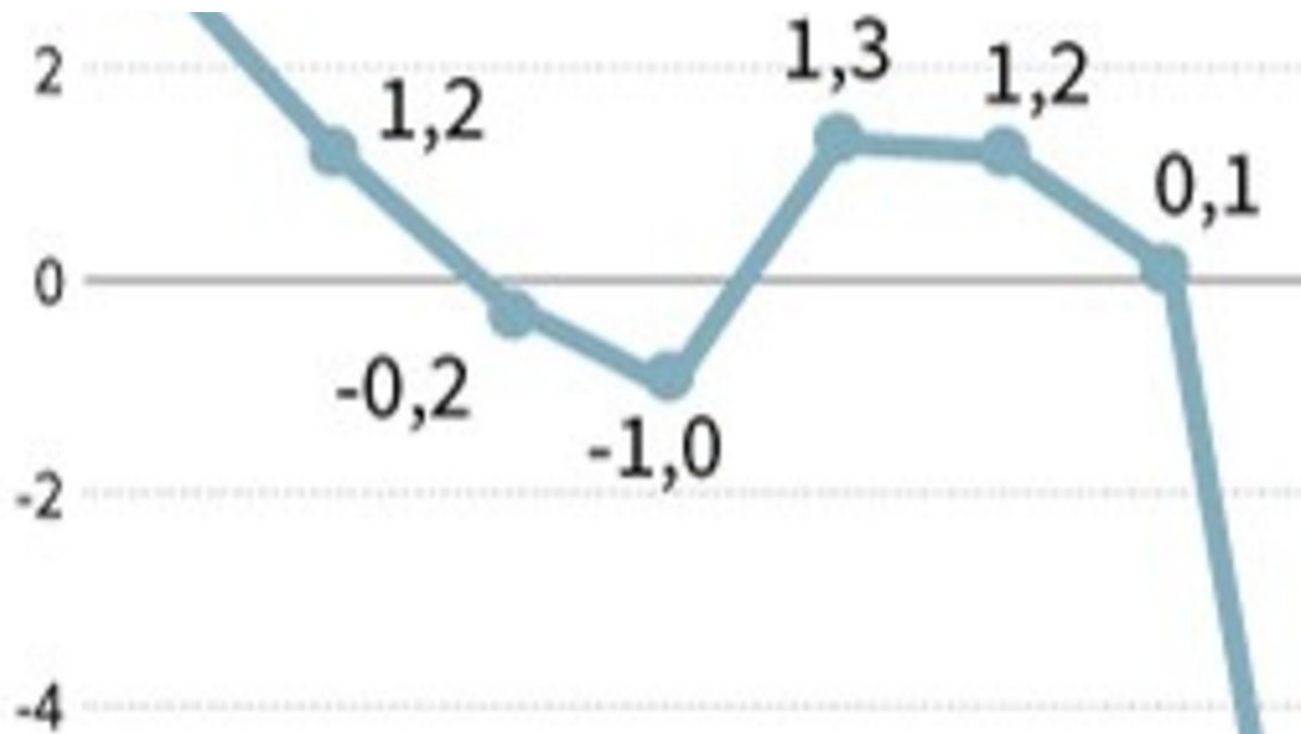

Building back better was also one of the main themes of last week's 'Speech from the Throne', which was delivered by the Governor General at the State Opening of Parliament.

She explained the Prime Minister has three 'overarching' objectives – keeping New Zealanders safe from Covid-19, accelerating our economic recovery, and laying the foundations for a better future.

According to the PM, "the recovery offers an opportunity to reshape the way things are done in New Zealand, to innovate and improve our position and our economy".

She outlined "a broader view of success... New Zealand's response to COVID would be insufficient if it were to simply return us to the way we were before the virus."

She wants to use the power of the State to re-shape New Zealand: “Recovering and rebuilding entails determined and connected action by government. That action can, and will, be used to reshape the economy to be more productive, more sustainable, and more equitable... The way we choose to govern is also a tool for change.”

British MP the Rt Hon Sir John Redwood, a former Chief Policy Advisor for Margaret Thatcher, could have been responding to our PM’s speech, when he stated: “I have no problem with the idea of building better or investing in a better future, but I do have problems with some of the agendas drawn up in the name of the Great Reset.”

The Great Reset agenda, which lies behind Labour’s ambitions, is clearly being more openly discussed in the UK than it is in New Zealand.

With its plan to replace the free market economic system with a form of progressive socialism, Sir John has serious misgivings: “Taxing work, enterprise and success more is a bad idea. Many of the great advances in living standards and quality of life have come from the innovation and enterprise of the private sector. It was not government effort that launched billions of smart phones and electronic pads on the world.

“It was not government which provided the cars to liberate many more people with flexible personal transport, or supplied the great entertainments of stage, screen and events. It is important that as we build back from lock downs these gains are banked and enhanced, with broadening of reach to ever more people.

“When the agenda proposes taxing and regulating the very products of the digital revolution and the transport revolution that have offered to the many the freedoms and advantages that used to be the preserve of the few I worry that build back better just becomes a cover for more state control over our lives.”

ANC president Cyril Ramaphosa says the ANC-led government has to decisively change the face of SA's economy, and not simply allow it to return to where it was before the devastating Covid-19 pandemic.

“In other words, our task is not only to build back better, but also to build forward differently. To bring about this change, we need a radical programme of action that is restorative, that rebuilds and that is transformative,” said Ramaphosa.

He was delivering the ANC's annual January 8 address, which was streamed live on TV and on the internet on Friday due to restrictive Covid-19 regulations.

"The draft masterplan for this smart city – which will become home to between 350,000 to 500,000 people within the next decade – was completed in November 2020 and is now out for public comment."

First of all, this is not the dream of Ramaphosa and it has nothing to do with breaking apartheid's spatial planning. Almost every head of state shares the same "dream" as Ramaphosa, but in reality this is the dream of the Technocrats, men and women who are actually in charge. This is part of the Great Reset.

The world is being revamped right in front of our eyes. Looking at the sketches of these smart cities globally, there is wall-to-wall surveillance everywhere and China is leading the race. People are forced from rural and suburban areas into high-rise flats in those large cities.

All over the world smart cities are springing up like mushrooms and the 5G technology is exactly what the doctor ordered to advance the project.

Could we see travel as a potential force for good, rather than a guilty pleasure that takes an unfortunate environmental or social toll?

At first, I felt the idea of Covid ushering in a new wave of meaningful travel was wishful thinking. As it goes on (and on), however, I think the case for a “great reset” is growing.

That was a term used by Euromonitor in a [recent report](#) predicting tourism will take at least three to five years to recover. That’s a big break; a space for games to change. The pandemic has “revealed some unpleasant truths about our former travel behaviours”, it adds. We saw satellite images of clearer skies, even as polar ice melted and Australia and California burned. And that’s sinking in.
