

## 1. How My Visit Went To A Walk-In Vaccination Clinic


The purpose of this fact gathering exercise was to see how busy the walk-in clinic was and to ask the vaccinator some questions or legitimate concerns I had about the v. New 2 1/25



2. I decided I would visit the O Reilly Hall in University College Dublin as it is one of the walk-in clinics. I arrived up with my phone and a bunch of @jamesdelingpole podcasts to keep me entertained as I had a few to catch up on.

3. I arrived at 9.35am & queued inside a small tent just outside the entrance. There was about 30 people ahead of me in the queue and 20 behind. It was meant to open at 10 but actually opened doors at 9.45. The queue was like being on the London Underground. Nobody talking.

4. It reminded me of a scene from Pink Floyd's The Wall. A bunch of masked up people going through the motions. They were just doing as they were told in the hope normality would return. <u>youtu.be/00c1hibtxRU</u>



5. One Mum who was with her teenage son was given short shrift when she tried to put her arm around him. She looked more nervous than he did and she had probably had the jab already.

A totally embarrassing mother as far as the teen was concerned (been there) i

6. In the queue there were probably about 25% 12-15 year olds with the parents. Others were going for their first dose or second dose. Pretty sure I was the oldest geezer in the queue. They were probably looking at me thinking I should have had it months ago.

7. There wasn't much social distancing in the queues either. Hand sanitiser on entry.

Very strict on no cameras and filming. As I entered the building I was asked to pull my mask up. I played along with the whole mask charade or I would never have got past the front door.

8. There were 3 marshals on the door, one asked if I had ID and also checked to see if I was there for the 1st or 2nd one and also checking that I hadn't had Covid recently. I was then ushered into the main check in area.


9. There were 12 check in booths. I was asked to give all my personal details which I did. Next they wanted to know if I had Mastocytosis, I said I had no idea what that was. The girl said she had no idea either 🙄

I was also asked questions about myocarditis & pericarditis..

10. ..to which I said no as well. Finally I was asked to give my consent for the v. I said yes.

She said nobody has ever said no to her (for the vaccine that is 😉 but that's a story for another day)

I was also given a Pfizer info pack as well which I'll get to in a separate 🧵



11. After that I proceeded onto the v area where there were 28 v booths in total. The army were also in close attendance. There was probably between 4 and 6 army members there. I definitely saw 4 anyway.

12. It was now time for the v. I was ushered towards a booth where a very nice nurse was going to administer the v. I was asked the same medical questions by her and if I gave full consent for the v. I said yes and she filled out my vax card. She asked me to roll up my sleeve.

13. It was then I took the phone out and asked her if she would mind if I asked her some questions about the v. She said no problem at all. I asked her 6 questions. I could have asked a lot more but wanted to keep it as simple as possible. Her answers are after each question.

14. Q1 Will the vaccine protect me from infection and prevent transmission?

A. No it doesn't but it does stop you getting long covid and reduces the likelihood of going to hospital and ICU.

15. Q2. Has the Vaccine received FDA approval or is it still in clinical trials ?

A. It's been approved, it got full approval last week so is no longer in clinical trials but there will always be ongoing trials

16. Q3. Is there any long term data on fertility?

A. This was a question she was concerned about as well she said (she was in her 20s). She said it was very safe in pregnant ladies but didn't know if there was fertility data.

17. Q4. Does the vaccine cause blood clots and myocarditis ?

A. She said the AZ one did but the Pfizer one doesn't. She also said you were more likely to get blood clots with covid than with the v. She also said there are very very few cases of myocarditis.

18. Q5. Will I need a booster shot at some stage ?

No not at the moment she said.

19. And my final question

Q6. Has anybody died from the Vaccine ?

A. No, not that she's aware of.

20. I then said it was a lot of information to take in and I wouldn't be proceeding with the v. She looked surprised & said she understood. She then put a line though my name on the form and said she wouldn't be able to give me the v card

I said that was fine, thanked her & left

21. I left at 10.15am and there were probably 150-200 people sitting down in the O Reilly Hall waiting. I think these were people who were getting their 2nd doses. Seemed to be quite a wait for that.

There was also a constant stream of people coming into the building.

22. What did I take from the whole experience. It was a military run operation (hence the army). Everyone was very efficient. The nurse who was administering the v was very patient with my questions and to the best of her knowledge she tried to answer them.

23. Here is the issue though it was "to the best of her knowledge"

I do feel however that the vaccinators are being kept in the dark about the approval status of the v as well as the side effects of it.

They also seem to be parroting what the mainstream media are saying.

24. I was also expecting more 12-15 year olds in the queue as that age group is the one who is being targeted at the moment. It is hard to tell what the uptake in that particular age cohort is and I would be very wary of any figures NPHET, HSE or government tell you.
